D- The Oriental Printing Press and the First Levantine Printed Books

Printing Houses:

- 1- The first modern Printing Press was invented by **Johannes Gutenberg** (±1400-1468) in **Mainz**, (Germany)
- 2- The first **Hebrew Printing House** was founded in Constantinople (Turkey) in 1493 by David Ibn Nahmias.
- 3- **Typographia del collegio romano** was the Press of the Jesuit College in Rome, and in 1566 Fr. Geovanni Baptista Eliano from the Society of Jesus added the **Arabic scripts** to the Print. However, the Arabic characters were rejected by experts, and the Medici Printing House took over the printing work of Arabic books. In 1577 **Hebrew scripts** were also added to it.
- 4- Cardinal Ferdinando de Medici founded the Medici Oriental Press/**Typographia Medicea** in 1584 in **Rome**, and it was the first Printing Press for Oriental languages. The Arabic types were made by the famous calligrapher Granjon (born in Paris in 1513). The **Typographia Medicea** was moved after 1614 to Pisa, and then to the Palazzo Vecchio in Florence.
- 5- The Arabic Printing Press of **Leiden** (Holland) was founded in 1595 by the French Orientalist Franciscus Raphelengius, who bought in 1585 the printing Plantin's office (**Officina Plantiniana**) in Leiden, Holland.

- 6- The Arabic Printing House of **Breslau** (Germany) was founded by Rutgher Spey and Jakob Christmann in 1607.
- 7- The Printing House of the **Monastery of Qozhaya** (Syriac scripts) was founded in 1610 in Lebanon by the Maronite Lebanese Order and Sarkīs Al-Rizzi (Sergius Risius).
- 8- **Typographia Savariana**, the Printing House of François **Savary de Brève**: 1613 (**Rome**)
- 9- **Typographia Savariana**/François **Savary de Brève**: 1614-1615 (**Paris**)
- 10- **Typographia Erpeniana Linguarum Orientalium** was founded by Thomas Erpenius in Leiden in 1614.
- 11- The Printing House of the **Maronite College**, 1620 (**Rome**)
- 12- The Oriental Press of the **Sacra Congregatio de Propaganda Fide** was founded in 1626 (**Rome**)
- 13- Cardinal Fredrico Barrameo founded **Ambrosiana Collegi Typographia** in the early 17th century, and Arabic scripts were added to it in 1630.
- 14- The **Oxford University Press** (UK) added in the early 17th century many Oriental scripts, including Arabic.
- 15- The **Cambridge University Press** (UK) added in the 1730s the Arabic scripts to its print.
- 16- The **Hebrew Printing House** in Izmir (Turkey) was founded by Avraham ben Yedidia Gabbay in 1657.
